Dear Parents/Carers,

RE: Anti-Bullying survey results

Many thanks for those who completed the annual survey regarding your views on bullying at The Craylands School.

The survey results, based on 49 responses, show that there have been some incidences of bullying at the school but that the school has dealt with incidences that have been reported; there is some concern that some of the bullying has continued and this is something that we will be addressing as a staff.

We have used the survey to put together an action plan for the year ahead so that we can address any concerns that the survey had brought to light; the main objectives can be seen below:

- Encourage parents/carers to continue to speak to staff if they have dealt with the bullying but it still continues.
- Look at how we can increase the confidence of the children to deal with bullying
- Keep a closer eye on things that may be happening within the classroom, whilst being more vigilant on the playground

Many thanks for completing the survey. We shall certainly look at the suggestions that many of you have made and implement those we may not already be doing.

- Be more vigilant – a lot is taking place in the classroom

- I think the school handle bullying well – but I would like to see more focus on mental health to make my child more confident- should he get bullied in the future he would have more courage to stand up for himself.
- My child has never had any issues with bullying....in the playground once a child called her an idiot because she dropped a ball while playing and the staff were straight onto it and dealt with it immediately; my daughter told me after school about that one incident which I wouldn't deem as anything to even consider, but pleased it wasn't allowed to become an incident. The school regularly do assembly and lesson about being responsible and respecting others and ensure that the children do not act rudely or judgemental to others.
